

AMERICAN ORIGINALS celebrates the music of Black and brown composers from the United States, Mexico, Cuba, and South America. This program of music by brilliant yet underrepresented composers explores how the blending of European, African, and indigenous styles created uniquely American sounds. Among the many treasures of this repertoire are Scott Joplin's sentimental and heartfelt 'Bethena', a song by Black American guitar virtuoso Justin Holland (a friend of Frederick Douglass), two works by the earliest known native Cuban classical composer, and a set of songs by the extraordinary Florence B. Price, who seamlessly blended Romantic art song and Spirituals into a sound all her own.
